



Ron Johnson was a 32-year inmate being released after serving ten years in prison for armed robbery. Growing

up with a difficult childhood, he entered a friendship with a gang of thieves.

One day, he found himself as the lookout while his friend robbed a convenience store. When the robbery took longer than he thought, Ron went inside to see what was happening. Upon entry, his friend handed him a money bag as he held his gun at the cashier. Ron's clear picture was recorded on the video camera from the store, and both were caught within hours.

Ten years later, on the day of his release, after having served his time, his father confronted him with a single question, "Are you still a criminal?"

Each of us struggles with the questions of who we indeed are. It is a question of our being, our existence, and perhaps even our identity. The father's question was painful but honest. Who was Ron Johnson? Was he a former criminal, or was he still a criminal?

Over the years, I have heard many people say something like, " *People never change*" or "once a (fill in the blank), then always a (fill in the blank)."

As Christians, our faith is based upon the presupposition that change is possible. *"With God, all things are possible."* Our past does not have to dictate our future. Our Christian vocabulary is filled with words promising transformation: *redemption, forgiveness, restoration, renewal, reconciliation, grace,* and *rebirth.* God's love and the grace found in Jesus Christ's sacrifice make these many words possible.

Faith in God reveals a way out of the cycle of past choices and its associated guilt and shame. Our path to a different future may be different for each person, but it is made possible only by the grace of God. No matter how uniquely and irreversibly

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crippling that person's shame might feel, the path to experience true freedom is through Christ.

One of Jesus' disciples, Peter, broke out of his prison of shame, although the struggle was intense and personal. Jesus had predicted this fisherman-turneddenier. Peter's failure was ironic, coming immediately and passionately profession that he would never turn on Jesus. "I'll stand faithfully by you until the end," he insisted.

Unfortunately, real-life events soon proved Peter wrong. A rooster's crow reminded Peter of his denial, forcing him to face his crushing triple failure. Yet Peter refused to believe the lie that his betrayal now branded him a traitor. Broken and repentant, Peter cried out to God for forgiveness. After His resurrection, Jesus honored Peter's desperate plea. Jesus' forgiveness and restoration gave Peter a renewed passion and the courage to preach a daring message at Pentecost.

Through the power of Jesus' atonement, his failure was transformed from a tragedy into a triumph. Peter's repentance and God's forgiveness became a character-building lesson that demonstrates the way to victory. We can become His children. He can forgive us. We can experience transformation bound by God's limitless love. Psalm 51 records the beautiful repentance of a fallen king, David.

Have mercy on me, O God, according to Your unfailing love; according to Your great

compassion, blot out my transgressions. Wash away all my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin... Create in me a pure heart, O God,. — Psalm 51:1-2.

Once we accept our unchangeable past, we can embrace God's grace, which can change our future. While we may never forget what happened, we are no longer required to be defined by it. We can become a new creation (2 Corinthians 5:17). God is constantly working to bring about good in our lives (to those called to his purposes, Romans 8:28). This requires us to trust God and walk the new path God prepares for us. In this, "the just shall live by faith."

Mark your calendars for the 2024 barn tour!

This year it will be held in Shelby County on Saturday, September 14th. The self-guided driving tour will feature the Rudicel-Montgomery Polygonal Barn, the site of this year's Learning Lab. Attendees will be able to learn the results of the recently completed assessment and laser scanning by Trillum Dell/Firmitas and better understand what it will take to save this community landmark. The Meltzer Farm will include their English barn, sawmill barn, log buildings, 1875 brick schoolhouse, and additional historic farm buildings. Six additional privatelyowned barns will include a flower farm, a cattle farm, and two former dairy farms.

Food trucks will dot the route and tour goers will find additional fun things to see and do including shopping for barn quilts and barn calendar postcards, a U-Pick pumpkin patch at Meltzer Farm and an invitation to stop by Harker Orchard for cider and other goodies.

Advance tickets are \$15 for IBF members or \$20 for non-members. Children 16 and under are
